Last month, with great sadness, I reported the passing of former HNSA executive director Jeff Nilsson. His family graciously asked for donations to be made to HSNA in lieu of flowers. Many people reached out to share their memories of Jeff and supported HNSA for \$1,750. Thank you to those of you who contributed or participated in his funeral service.

Donations like these to HNSA and our various member museums matter. The State of Veracruz just announced it will scrap the museum ship A.R.M. *Guanajuato* for \$90,000. Built in Spain for the Mexican Navy in 1934, she escorted convoys during World War II and served until 2001. In 2009 she was opened near the Port of Veracruz, with her operators claiming she was the first museum ship in Latin America. A significant maintenance project had to be ended because of COVID-19 and unfortunately her name must now be added to the roll of museums that did not survive the pandemic.
