Museum Receives \$11k Bridge Grant

Larry Murray Executive Director Patriots Point Naval & Maritime Museum Patriots Point Naval & Maritime Museum received an \$11,000 Bridge Grant from South Carolina Humanities (www.schumanities.org). Funding for Bridge Grants has been provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Securities (CARES) Act economic stabilization plan.

"We are very grateful for the needed help," said Patriots Point Executive Director Larry Murray. "This virus hit at the busiest time of the year for us. This money will help cover operational costs incurred while we were closed."

The museum was closed for more than 60 days as a precautionary measure against the spread of COVID-19. It reopened Friday, May 22, with several new health safety measures in place to protect visitors.

Jeremiah O'Brien Shed C Fire Update

Matt Lasher, Executive Director of the National Liberty Ship Memorial, has provided some updates on the recent fire aboard SS *Jeremiah O'Brien* in late May 2020.

Recovery, investigation, and damage assessments have begun at Pier 45. While the *O'Brien* did not receive catastrophic damage in the fire, the organization did. They lost items in storage and other pier side assets. They are working with the Port of San Francisco to identify a new temporary home for the ship.

The "lucky O'Brien" has once again escaped certain destruction. Their Captain said, "MIRACLE - and I don't use that term lightly. When you see bent steel girders from the 1,000 degree fire 50 feet from the ship and there appears to be no steel or even external paint damage, it is the way I would describe it."

At the end of May, they moved from their home at Pier 45 to a new temporary home at Pier 35 North. This is for a period of two months while the Port and other agencies clear debris and complete inspections of Pier 45's infrastructure.

"Foss Maritime provided free tug service for the move and many other companies have provided us logistical and material support. Thank you all!The new home berth at 35 North is leased to Metro Cruise via the Port of San Francisco. Both Metro Cruise and the Port worked quickly to accommodate us and we are very grateful for the new temporary space." - Matt Lasher



New Associate Member in Sacramento, CA

HNSA is happy to announce a new Associate Member, the Maritime Pastoral Training Foundation, Ltd., headed by the Rev. Kempton D. Baldridge, Senior River Chaplain. After negotiating the eventual transfer of HNSA Fleet Member PTF-26 from Liberty Maritime Museum of Sacramento, CA, to Paducah, KY, the Foundation will continue to preserve, maintain, and exhibit the historic Vietnam War gunboat, "The Last American PT Boat," in tribute to the service and sacrifice of the U.S. Military.

Once the transfer is made, PTF-26 will be rechristened Training Ship Jessie L. Brown to provide the training vessel for the region's Sea Cadets, Sea Scouts, and NJROTC Cadets. The PT-Boat will also be used to strengthen and expand the work of maritime chaplaincies throughout North America and by coordinating with The Seamen's Church Institute, and create a maritime chaplains school with a three-week residential course aboard PTF-26. Not surprisingly, PTF-26's trans-shipment from Northern California to the Ohio River had to be postponed due to the COVID-19 outbreak. But the

plans call for PTF-26 to be moored at the former Jeffboat Shipyard as a temporary exhibit at the Louisville Naval Museum in Jeffersonville, IN, while a new dock is built for her in Paducah, KY, the city having received a considerable BUILD grant to include a 1000' excursion dock."



USCGC INGHAM Museum Historian Appointed

At the suggestion of Bill Verge of the USCGC *Ingham* Musem in Key West, Florida, Lynn Conley was appointed Historian of the Association by President, Dean Beach. Lynn was appointed on December 7, 2019, to fill the vacancy of the office left by the passing of Dick Booth. The appointment was made in accordance with the by-laws of the association which states "In the event of a vacancy caused by resignation, illness, death or removal for "cause," a replacement shall be appointed by the President to complete the term of that member.'

Lynn has become an asset to the USCGC Ingham Association since joining in 2010. She attended her first meeting in 2004 at the request of her Father-In-Law, Thaddeus Krainski, Chief Electrician Mate who was on the ship from 1942-1946. Lynn has been an active participant becoming the editor of the association newsletter "Scuttlebutt" in 2014. Lynn also became instrumental in planning the biannual reunions and in 2016 she received the John M. Waters Medal which is given to those who perform outstanding works for the organization.



As a graduate of the University of Tennessee with a degree in education, her commitment to preserving the history of the Cutter *Ingham* can be seen in her annual trips to the ship to provide archiving services, a program she started in 2017 with Alex Appel and Bill Verge. Lynn also provided the data and material for the USCGC Ingham Association website HERE. Her desire to preserve and disseminate the history of "MIGHTY I" made her an excellent choice for the position of Historian.
